### Schedule:

**Noon:** Site opens.

**1 pm:** Barroom Brawl; class on period games, with emphasis on those to be played that evening

**2 pm:** Discussion with Master Melitus about A&S contests in general with emphasis on Queen's Prize

**All afternoon:** Darts, games and camaraderie around a roaring fire

**4 pm:** Baronial Court

**5 pm:** Soup, bread, beer and entertainment

**6:30 pm:** Gaming Hall opens. All gambling "money" supplied by the Baronage! (Coffee and desserts appear.)

**9:30 pm:** Auction to spend your gambling winnings

We are also looking for contributions of bread and desserts. Some ideas and recipes are included on the next page. There will be extra gambling coins for those who bring one or both for the main meal or dessert bar.

If you will not arrive until close to the time that the soup will be served (5 pm), please consider bringing bread and/or dessert. Vegetables arriving at 4:55 pm will be too late to get into the soups!

Beer will be provided by a private individual, with donations accepted. Home brew will be served to those with proper ID, and when it runs out, we'll switch to commercial brands. You may also bring your own liquor, but site rules require that it be kept at the bar (with your name on it), where you may refill your cup as needed.

Hot drinks will be provided all afternoon and evening.

### And Lots of Other Stuff:

Baronial Court will begin around 4 pm. Please help give our wise and generous Baron and Baroness a warm send-off, as this will probably be one of their last courts.

Musicians, dancers, and story tellers will entertain us during the dinner and gambling hours. Tipping (in the form of the supplied gambling coins) is highly encouraged!

Master Melitus will be leading a discussion on A&S competitions in the afternoon. This will be a great opportunity for the novice to pick up pointers and connect with like-minded individuals, and those experienced in the A&S arena are encouraged to come and share their experiences.

A period rendition of darts is being created, and there are rumors of tournaments and grudge-matches highlighting the gambling hall hours

There are two fireplaces, both of which lend themselves to relaxing and practicing the fiber arts with friendly company.

Late breaking additions to the schedule and activities will be posted on the Baronial email list and website.

### The More Than You Wanted to Know Version:

**Fighting:** Hopefully, the weather will cooperate and we can get in some outdoor fighting, including a barroom brawl or two in which the only weapons allowed are simulations of items found in a tavern. Suggestions include furniture (chair legs), food (fish, loaf of bread) and dishes (serving platter, beer mug). All weapons must meet the usual safety standards, and there will be prizes!

**Games:** Period board games, card decks and dice will be available all afternoon and evening. In addition to teaching a games class at 1 pm, Lord Primyerious will help all who want to learn a new game or make use of his extensive collection of period games throughout the day.

The gambling games planned for the gaming hall in the evening include Poch, Triumphe, 31, Gluckshaus, Shut the Box, knucklebones, Mancala and Tablero de Jesus. The gambling games will range from the extremely simple to the somewhat complex, but all have been selected for playability by "non-gamers" and dabblers. "Dealers" will be available to explain as you play, to help rotate in new players, and to deal the cards as each game requires.

**Auction:** You will be able to spend your winnings at an auction, where the prizes to date include handmade food, clothing, fabric, dice, toys and game boards, as well as books and period reproduction playing cards. Even if you aren't interested in gambling, you can bid using the coins given to you at troll!

**Food and Drink:** Our fare will be simple but satisfying and tasty. We plan to prepare a beef and barley soup with vegetables, a hearty chicken noodle soup with homemade noodles, a vegetarian lentil soup and a vegetarian squash/gourd soup. We encourage the use of period pantry items, and we are asking that as part of your site fee you bring one or more of these items:

Carrots, celery, leeks, mushrooms, onions, parsnips, peas, honey, Half& Half or heavy cream, flour (for noodles) or eggs (for noodles or as a boiled side).

# Period Recipes Perfect for SCA Events

**Editor's Note:** If you're attending the Bloody Trident Inn on January 12,

you're encouraged to bring a bread or dessert to add to the potluck.

Although you can find period-appropriate breads and even desserts at the grocery store (like apple cobbler), the following recipes may spur you to make your own.

### A Good Basic Bread

Below you'll find a recipe I've used many times, and I have always had good luck with it.

### Dessert Suggestions to Maintain a Period Atmosphere:

Fresh fruit is always a great idea. The following fruits may have been found in

period: apples, apricots, blackberries, blueberries, cherries, figs/dates, gooseberries, grapes, melons, peaches, pears, plums, pomegranates, quinces, raspberries, red currants and strawberries.

So if you feel like baking, try one of these:

Baked apples/baked apples in pastry (see link below)

Biscotti

Custards

Fine cakes (cinnamon and sugar cakes – see link below)

Fruit pies or pastries

Pizelle-type wafers/cookies

Shortbread

Shrewsbury cakes (see link below)

Here's an original recipe from Gervase Markham, *The English Huswife*:

“To make fine cakes; take a pottle of fine flour, and a pound of butter, a pound of sugar, a little

mace and a good store of water to mingle the flour into a stiff paste, and a good season of salt and so knead it, and roll out the cake thin and bake them on papers.”

### Modern recipe:

6 cups soft butter

1 ½ tsp. salt

3 cups granulated sugar

½ Tbs. cinnamon

12 cups unbleached flour

Cream together sugar, salt and butter. Mix together cinnamon and flour. Add this to creamed mixture, adding water as needed to make the dough manageable.

Press dough into 2-3 baking sheets lined with baking parchment; prick with fork at regular intervals. Bake at 325 degrees F for 30 minutes; cut into 100 squares while still warm.



### A Good Basic Bread from a Period Recipe

I have used this recipe many times, with the bread turning out well. I simply delete the steps of hollowing out the loaves, mixing in the butter, and refilling the loaves. The notations in italics are my additions.

**Redaction:** From *Take a Thousand Eggs or More: A Collection of 15th Century Recipes, Volume 1*, by Cindy Renfrew:

**Rastons** – A Period Bread Recipe #136 from Harleian MS. 401:

2 Tablespoons sugar

2 eggs, beaten

1 cup warm water (105 to 115 degrees F)

1 package yeast

2 to 3 cups flour

2 ½ cups *clarified butter* (I omitted, explained in notes to follow)

Mix 2 cups of flour and yeast together. Add sugar to flour mixture.

In a separate container mix eggs and warm water together. Add egg mixture to flour mixture. Add enough additional flour to make a stiff dough.

Add sugar to flour mixture.

In a separate container mix eggs and warm water together.

Add egg mixture to flour mixture.

Add enough additional flour to make a stiff dough. Knead until smooth.

Cover and rise until double.

Punch down and form into loaf. (I formed this into two loaves.)

Let rise for 45 minutes.

Bake at 400 degrees F for 25 to 30 minutes or until loaf is hollow when tapped.

**Note:** The following is part of the original recipe, but I left the loaves whole:

*When cooled, cut off the top crust and scoop out the center of the loaf. Chop the crumbs and mix with clarified butter.*

*Replace the crumb mixture in the hollowed loaf, replace the top crust, and warm the loaf for about 10 minutes to heat the butter before serving.*

*Remove from oven and serve hot.*

### Fresh fruit is always a great idea:

*Apples, apricots, blackberries, blueberries, cherries, figs/dates, gooseberries, grapes, melons, peaches, pears, plums, pomegranates, quinces, raspberries, red currants and strawberries.*

# A Look at the Game of Poch

One of the games that will be played at the Bloody Trident Inn on January 12 is the card game Poch.

Poch is at least 500 years old and is still popular in Germany (*Pochspiel*, *Pochen*). According to the German Wikipedia page, Pochen is a very old card game that dates back to at least 1441.\*

Here in the U.S. you may have played a variation of it known as Michigan Rummy or Tripoli (Tripoley, Three in One). It combines aspects of both card-matching games and poker.

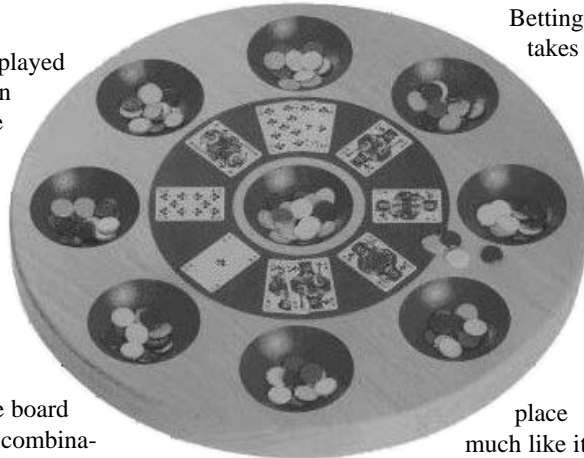
Modern German Poch is played with a 32-card deck (7 through King, plus Ace). Earlier versions of the game sometimes used 36 cards. A round board with nine sections for chips is used. The board is marked with eight cards or card combinations: Ace, King, Queen, Jack, 10, Marriage (both the King and Queen), Sequence (the 7, 8 and 9 cards) and Pocher (Joker). The center pot is unmarked.

Players are given a supply of chips, and before the cards are dealt, each player must place a chip in each of the nine pots.

The game is played in three stages. During the first stage the dealer deals the cards one at a time, clockwise, placing the last card face up. This card determines the "pay suit." The players who hold the Ace, King, Queen, Jack, 10, King and Queen, and 7, 8 and 9 cards in that suit collect the chips. Depending on the deal, some pots will not be claimed during that hand. More chips will be added during the next hand.

During the second stage the game resembles poker. Players assess their hands and begin betting. Four of a kind beats three of

a kind, which beats a pair. Higher-numbered cards beat lower-numbered cards (three Kings beat three Queens) and in tied pairs the pair with the pay suit card wins. (Note: Only those combinations are allowed. No full houses or straights in Poch.)



Betting takes

place much like it

does in poker, continuing until players drop out (fold) or bet an equal amount. Those who haven't folded show their hands and the winner takes both the chips that were bet and the chips in the Pocher (Joker) pot.

The third stage determines the winner of the center pot. The winner of the second stage begins by playing any card from his hand face up in the center (on top of the chips). Whoever holds the next higher card of the same suit plays next, then the third card in the sequence is played and so on. No numbers may be skipped. If the 8 of hearts is played, it must be followed by the 9 of hearts and the 10 of hearts. This continues until no one has the next card in the sequence (because it was previously played). The last person to play a card begins the next sequence with whatever card he chooses, and play continues until

that suit can no longer be played. This continues until one of the players runs out of cards. The cardless player collects the center pot as well as chips from the other players, one for each card they still have in their hands.

During SCA period, this third phase was most likely played differently. The center pot was won by the player whose cards came closest to totaling 31.

After one of the players gets rid of all his cards and collects the center pot, the cards are collected, play begins again with the first stage, and the game continues until one of the players runs out of chips. The player with the most chips wins.

Endless variations on this game occurred during the 18th and 19th centuries, so it is likely that many variations existed during SCA period. For an in-depth look at the modern rules and the older variations, see John McLeod's excellent site (<http://www.pagat.com/stops/poch.html>). McLeod states that a detailed early history of the game can be found in an article by Thierry Depaulis: "Pochspiel: An 'International' Card Game of the 15th Century," published in *The Playing-Card* (Journal of the International Playing-Card Society) in three parts, in Vol XIX No 2 (Nov 1990), Vol XIX No 3 (Feb 1991) and Vol XIX No 4 (May 1991).

\* From the Babelfish translation of <http://de.wikipedia.org/wiki/Pochen>: "Poch is a very old pack of cards, which was already mentioned in the year 1441 in Strasbourg. French emigrants brought the Poque to America, where itself in 19. Century from it the poker game developed – in the name Poker, from English ton poke (dt. pound) is to be heard the French Poque easily." (Don't you just love Internet translations?)

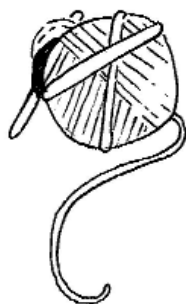

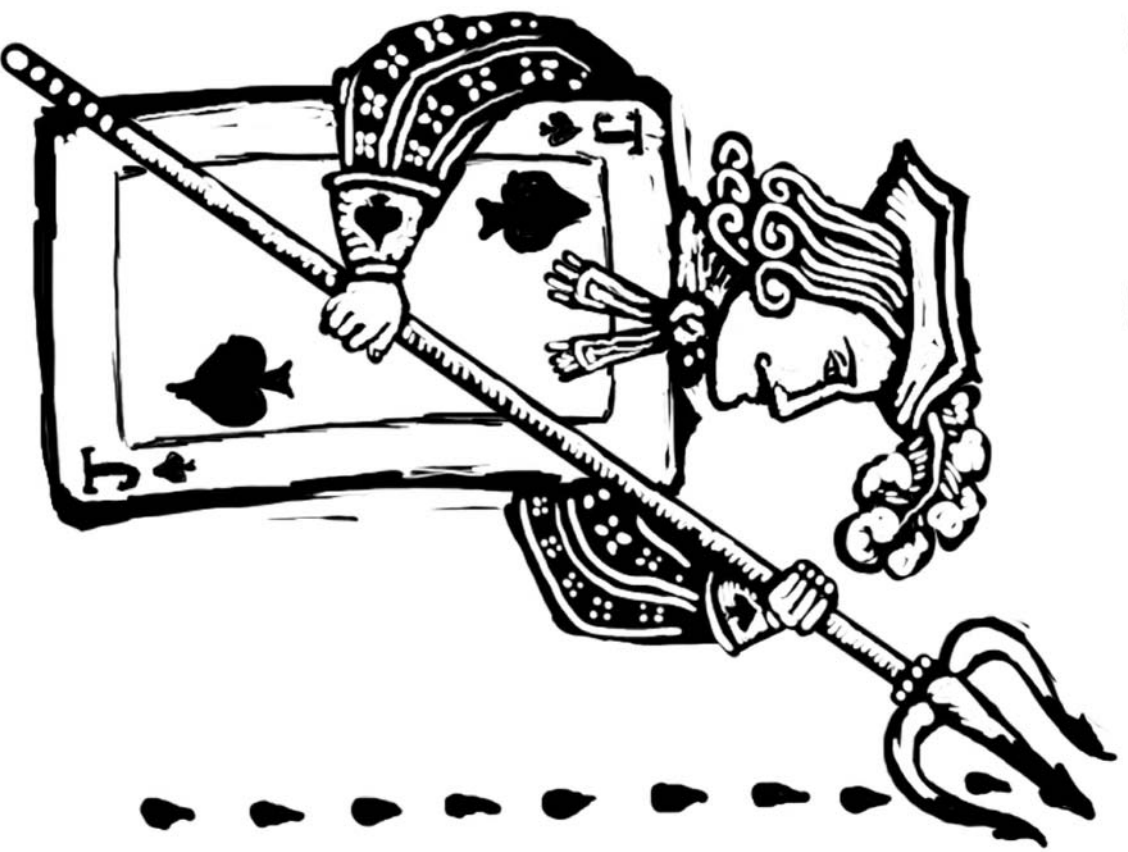
